If you don't need one of your books any longer, don't throw it away. Better share it with other book lovers and make someone else **happy** by releasing your book into the wild. The project is called Bookcrossing and you can start participating right now! Here's an easy guide about the essentials of Bookcrossing.

Label vour book

First, you should **register** the book you want to release. Just visit the Bookcrossing homepage http://www.bookcrossing.com/ and get a unique Bookcrossing ID for your book. This code lets you to **follow** your specific book wherever it goes and allows you to find out where it has travelled. You can either download free labels and print them from your computer, order labels from special collections or create custom labels using your own image and message.

Release it

After you've labelled your book it's ready to travel across the world. Release it into the wild, so that your book can get out there and experience adventures. You could leave it on a table in your favourite coffee shop, **hide** it in a tree in a park next door or just "forget" it in the underground. There are also places that are "Official Bookcrossing Zones", like libraries or pubs, where bookcrossers regularly leave and collect books.

Follow it

A few days after you've left you book in a place where it's likely to be **caught** by another delighted reader, come back to the website and find out where in the world your book goes, and who reads it. When another reader finds your book, they can enter the BCID to report it's been caught. They can also leave journal entries to tell others what they **think** about the book. Imagine – your book may touch the life of a person you never would have met.
